HOY CONVICTED GETS 7 YEARS

Man Who Shot Mrs. Henry Norris, His Cousin, Immediately Sentenced When Jury Returns Verdict.

(Special to the Evening Telegraph.)
BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Oct. 9.—On trial but two days William Hoy was not only convicted of attempted murder but was immediately sentenced by Judge North to from five to ten years in Jackson prison, with a recommendation of seven. For a trial of this kind Hoy's case was surprisingly short.

Hoy, who had come over from Ireland to work for Henry Norris, husband of his cousin, became infuriated with Mrs. Norris, it is claimed, but not finding his affection returned became ugly and was ordered to leave the Norris farm. Without reply he went into the house and returned with a shotgun. Mrs. Norris grabbed his shoulders, but too late to ward off the charge that tore her breast and nearly caused her death. Hoy then hit her on the head with the butt of the gun and ran away, but was easily captured.

MISSING BOY MAY HAVE BEEN KIDNAPED

That Theory Now Entertained by Detroit Police.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 9.—Was Donald Cullen, the 8-year-old son of Mrs. E. M. Cullen, 28 Twenty-first street, supposedly drowned at the foot of Twenty-first street last Sunday, kidnaped by his father, who left Detroit for Australia three months ago? Or is the little boy in blue whom Fort street car carried from Twenty-first street Artillery avenue in the company of a larger boy, at the identical hour when the drowning is supposed to have occurred?

Both possibilities are being considered by the Detroit police since yesterday morning, when Rev. A. H. Cameron, pastor of Emmanuel Presbyterian church, called upon Supt. Dewney with information that discounts the drowning theory to a certain extent.

FAST PASSENGER TRAIN CRASHES INTO FREIGHT

Engineer and Fireman Jump; Are Slightly Injured.

VERMONTVILLE, Mich., Oct. 9.—While one freight train was standing on the main track of the Grand Rapids Jackson division of the Michigan Central at this station a fast freight train came around a curve and crashed into the rear of the standing train. The engineer, Arthur Miller and fireman George Russell, both of Jackson, jumped. Miller sustained a severe injury on the head, but Russell escaped with slight bruises. The caboose and four cars were demolished and the engine was thrown on its side and badly damaged.

SHOOTER SURRENDERS.

CEDAR SPRINGS, Mich., Oct. 9.—John Benedict, the young man who is charged with shooting Edward Robinson, his aged father-in-law, during one stage of a long-standing quarrel, has surrendered himself to the sheriff. Benedict pleaded not guilty and was released under \$1,000 bail. The trouble between the two started when Benedict eloped with Robinson's daughter.

YEGG IS HELD FOR TRIAL.

MUSKEGON, Mich., October 9.—The third degree did not phase James Kelly, the yegman captured at Ravenna by Deputy Carl Stauffer after desperate hand-to-hand encounter. The only further information vouchsafed by Kelly was that his home has been in the southern part of the state. He was bound over to the circuit court on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

DEAN COOLEY PLANS COURSE IN HIGHFLYING

Will Lecture on the Make and Control of Airships.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 9.—Plans are being made by Dean M. E. Cooley, of the engineering department, of University of Michigan, for a course in aeronautics, which will be the first of its kind to be introduced in any educational institution in the United States or abroad. Realizing the great interest that is being taken in aerial navigation, the rapid advancement that has been made in the science, and the fact that it will in a comparatively short time become practical, and consequently men are willing to invest in the enterprise. Dean Cooley is preparing a course of lectures to be given to all who desire to gain an insight in aeroplanes, their construction, the laws which govern their control, and the difficulties which must be overcome in their successful management.

KALAMAZOO GIRL THE FIRST TO GET HONORS

Miss Frieda Kleinstick in Second Year of Law Course.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 9.—Possessing an A. B. degree, Miss Frieda Kleinstick, of Kalamazoo, is in her second year of law work at the U. of M. and will be the first woman law student to be graduated. Miss Kleinstick is the other woman aspirant to the bar in this department. A number of women graduates in this department have passed the bar, yet those who have attempted it, are successful. A number have gone into the government service and one, Miss Gilmore, now occupies a well-salaried position with the department of justice in the Philippine Islands.

INDIAN STABS BROTHER THEN MAKES ESCAPE

Charles Williams May Now Die of Injury.

PINCINNING, Mich., Oct. 9.—Joe, Charles and Al Williams, three Indians, alighted from a Michigan Central train here and started down the Saginaw bay shore on their way to the farm of an uncle where they were to work. On the way they got into a quarrel and Joe is alleged to have drawn a knife and stabbed Charles in the back and arm. The wounded man nearly died to death and now lies in a precarious condition in Mercy hospital at Bay City. Officers are hunting for the assassin.

Judge Andrews decided that Lynn should be made a ward of the court, until matters in the home could be adjusted.

ONLY SALOONS MUST CLOSE SAYS ATTY-GEN.

Only Business Affected by Columbus Day Observance.

LANSING, Mich., Oct. 9.—From the office of the attorney-general comes the statement that so far as the closing of business places are concerned, only saloons are affected by act 253 passed by the legislature designating October 12 as a holiday to be known as Columbus day.

Gayler Bolton Unable to Overcome Desire for Liquor, Drinks Carbolic Acid and Dies in Agony.

SAGINAW, Mich., Oct. 9.—"Well, Carrie, here goes," said Gayler Bolton to Mrs. Carrie Bassett, 806 North Payette street, as he lay on a couch, lifting a two-ounce bottle of carbolic acid to his mouth and draining the contents.

Mrs. Bassett screamed and tried to grab the bottle, but was late. By the time a doctor arrived Bolton was dead.

Bolton, who was a metal polisher was dependent over his inability to stop drinking and had determined to end his life.

Bolton's parents live at Samaria, Mich. He also leaves a widow, with whom he had not been living for some time, and three small children a boy and two girls in a charitable institution in Toledo. He was 40 years old.

CAN'T SEND TAX BILLS THROUGH U. S. MAIL

City Treasurer Runs Against Government Regulation.

(Special to the Evening Telegraph.)
DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 9.—In trying to help several thousand property owners of Detroit, Treasurer Max Koch has run bang up against one of the State's semi-criminal regulations. A big batch of official notices has been barred from the mails as unmailable, by order of Assistant United States Attorney-General R. P. Goodwin of Washington.

The notices, printed on postal cards, are intended to inform property owners that special assessments are standing against their property for sewers, street openings, paving, sidewalks or similar improvements, the cost of which is not included in the general tax levy. Hundreds of thousands of these special assessments are levied every year, and several thousand property owners forget all about them, or neglect to pay them.

12,000,000 BUSHELS OF WHEAT.
LANSING, Mich., Oct. 9.—According to the state crop report issued today, the total number of bushels of wheat grown in Michigan is estimated at 12,000,000. The average yield was 19 bushels per acre and was of good quality. It is estimated that 95 per cent as much wheat has been sown this year as there was on an average for the last five years.

The estimated total yield of rye is fixed at 5,000,000 bushels; oats, 41,000,000; corn, 52,000,000; beans, 4,000,000 bushels, and sugar beets, 800,000,000 tons.

JUDGE BOOSTS GAME OF TICKET SPECULATORS

New York Managers Will Carry It Up; Frohman Again Going to Europe; Week's New Plays.

[Special to the Evening Telegraph.] NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Speculators in theater tickets are in high feather on account of the decision of Judge Mulqueen of the court of general session of New York, in effect that anybody has the right to buy and sell tickets as he pleases, so long as he does not make himself a public nuisance.

Managers, who have hoped to be able to stop sidewalk speculation, which, they contend, amounts to a holdup of theater-goers, hope that the higher court may declare Judge Mulqueen's finding null and void. Otherwise they will be obliged to fight it out on the ground that ticket sellers as they conduct their business, as public nuisances—and they might be able to make that stick.

Charles Frohman is still a very busy man with prospective productions, which will be added to an already important list. One of the things soon to be produced is the long-delayed "Chanticleer" of Rostand, in which Coquelin pere, was ready to star at the time of his death. This, too, Mr. Frohman is planning another trip to Europe to pick up some good plays.

By the way, it is said Frohman likes Willie Collier so well that he is formulating a plan by which the comedian will appear in but four seasons during a year—London, New York, Boston and Philadelphia.

Frederic Thompson has sprung another surprise. After his wife, Mabel Tallaferro, had made an enviable reputation he has decided to change her name in her new play, "Neil," produced in Philadelphia Monday night. Miss Tallaferro was down on the program as Neil, and her husband announces that she will from now on bear that name.

Somerset Maugham's latest comedy, "Smith," has scored a great success in London. Mr. Maugham is one of the most prolific of modern dramatic writers.

"The Passing of the Third Floor Back," in which Forbes Robertson has just opened his season in New York, has made a tremendous hit. As a general rule, the play is a symmetrical, something like "The Servant in the House." Jerome K. Jerome, author of the play, shares in the honors. Mr. Robertson appears at his best and he is supported by a capable company.

"F" AND "S" MIX IN MICHIGAN'S FIRST PAPER

Dr. W. S. Tomkinson Possesses Rare Old Sheet Containing News of Napoleon and Other Things.

"Fs" looks like "Ss" and "Ss" like "Fs" in the first paper ever published in Michigan, which was on exhibition at the Bronson cabin during the Silver Anniversary.

"The Michigan Essay," the name of the paper, was published in Detroit by James M. Miller, and one of the first copies struck off is in the possession of Dr. W. S. Tomkinson. The "Michigan Essay," or the "Impartial Observer," was a breezy sheet in its day, partly printed in English and partly in French. The news was divided into departments as follows: "Foreign Intelligence," "Poetry," "Humor," "Handy," "Humorous." Most of the news was a month or so old, and scoops were few in those days, but the Essay showed up remarkably well on the local.

The advertising rates were given as follows: "Advertisements, not exceeding a square, inserted 3 weeks for 1 dol. and 50 cts." Then an ominous hand pointing to this: "All advertisements must be accompanied by the cash."

The "Essay" was published first at a time when warfare was tearing Europe inside out, and when things were happening fast on the other side. All of these European events excited intense interest in the new republic of America. In those days news travelled slowly. There was no telegraph, telephone, nor cable. Even the railroad was undeveloped. Fulton was experimenting with the Clermont. News travelled by letter and by messenger, but it found eager readers all over the country.

Under the caption "Foreign Intelligence," such items of news as the following are found:

"From Prussia we learn that the news of the war between Russia and Austria had reached warfairs—that the Austrians had left Warsaw, which they had entered, and that the duke Ferdinand had been forbidden by Prussia to violate the peace of Silesia. On the 13th of May the Russians were within two days march of Warsaw, and the duke Ferdinand was on his retreat."

"The Saxon army had reached Lintz on the 17th of May, and was marching for Vienna."

Couriers for the French emperor passed Leipzig on the 21st of May from Russia and from Sweden.

The French papers contain several bulletins of the army of Germany. A previous date to those we have mentioned, but we had not time to examine them.

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CURING UNEMPLOYMENT.

Thousands of working people being at the point of starvation in London. Mr. Sidney Webb, an English economist, is presenting a plan, at monster mass meetings, "to end unemployment."

He thus classes the unemployed. (1) men who lose jobs through bad work, or the failure of their employers in business; (2) men of the building trades who become idle through finishing their work; (3) casual laborers, those who never stick to anything long; (4) the unemployed who are unemployed because of drink, shiftlessness or other incapacity.

Mr. Webb's remedies for unemployment are an elaborate system of registration of jobs, formation of reserves of labor for towns, and labor colonies, but it is doubtful whether any of these measures could be successfully worked out. Under a paternal form of government, when London has hard times, the towns are very apt to have proportionately hard times, as one of the penalties of centralization, and dumping the surplus labor on the towns would simply spread the trouble, instead of curing it.

But to labor colonies, emigration, England and most all the other great foreign nations must soon seriously turn for relief. There is a limit to the number of people land will support, and the limit has been reached, in England at any rate. Even Germany, at present one of the most prosperous nations on earth, is over-crowded, there can be no mistake in taking the kaiser's extraordinary preparations for war as meaning his foresight as to the necessity for territorial extension.

Now, we people of the United States are really deeply concerned in all this. We have got to prepare to take care of a tremendous flood of immigration. We ought to have stricter laws for exclusion of "undesirables," including the Japs. But, at bottom, the real question with us is as to whether we shall permit the hordes from abroad to crowd into the cities and become mere servitors or direct them to our millions of unoccupied, uncultivated farm lands, and thus, by giving them a personal interest in the land, cause them to finally become independent and patriotic.

FLYING—THE SECOND STAGE.

The decision of the Wright brothers to give no more demonstration flights, but to devote their time hereafter to teaching aviators and making and selling aeroplanes, brings flying to its second stage. Experiments will not cease, but the making of aeroplanes has become an established commercial business.

Glenn Curtiss may be right in predicting that it will "require years and years" to perfect airships. When he has added that they are "splendid sporting machines" and that "as an aid in warfare they have already arrived" he has said enough to show why the Wrights need a bigger factory.

The seven leading nations are spending \$1,400,000,000 a year on war preparations. They will put money into aeroplanes and dirigibles as fast as conservatism will permit and the new vehicles prove their feasibility. The thought of carrying passengers, and especially freight, through the air need not trouble inventors for the present. It may never prove practicable.

By comparison with airship and aeroplane developments the balloons in the St. Louis and Zurich races have attracted little attention. The world has known for a century that men can travel in the air at the wind's will. What is wanted is an air machine that will travel at the will of man; and at last we are on the way to it.

SUBSIDIES FOR THE MERCHANT MARINE.

The last vote taken in the house of representatives on a ship subsidy bill was recorded on March 2 of this year, when a change of two votes would have passed the bill, and as the senate had already acted favorably upon it it would have been sent to a president who had frequently urged legislation to revive the American merchant marine. He is even more robust and emphatic in advocating ship subsidies than Mr. Roosevelt was. At Seattle the other day Mr. Taft declared that "there is no subject to which congress can better devote its attention in the coming session than the passage of a bill which shall encourage our merchant marine." The subject, it may be assumed, will occupy a good deal of room, and a very prominent place, in his first annual message in December, which will be addressed to a congress strongly Republican in the senate, and Republican in the house by a majority of 45, as compared with 55 in the Sixtieth congress.

In his speech at Seattle Mr. Taft referred to the fact, although he did not dwell upon it, that we maintained a protective tariff to encourage home industries but neglected to follow the example of Germany (a tariff country) and free trade England, which subsidized their ships engaged in foreign trade. With characteristic frankness Mr. Taft said:

"Of course we are familiar with the argument that this would be contributing to private companies out of the treasury of the United States, but we are thus contributing in various ways, on similar principles in effect, both by our protective tariff law, by our river and harbor bills and by our reclamation service."

The early American mail subsidies were voted by Democratic congresses at a time when Democratic presidents vigorously urged such protection to the merchant marine that it might outstrip its British competitor, a fact that seems to be forgotten by Democrats of the present day who balk at the mention of a ship subsidy. It is the policy of 1860 and not that of the first half of the nineteenth century that now inspires them. At the same time it must be admitted that the Republican party, which is responsible for most of the tariff laws enacted since the civil war, has failed to appreciate the value of subsidies in creating and sustaining a merchant marine. Republican presidents have seen the light, but the party has never voted together on the subject. There was protection for home industries, but none, or very little, in the form of money subsidies for the protection of ships engaged in foreign trade.—New York Sun.

Breakfast Foods to Make Pigs Brainy

WOOSTER, O., Oct. 9. — They are growing grayer matter for pigs at the state agricultural station here by feeding them brain food. Dr. E. B. Forbes is in charge and is meeting with success.

They put ordinary porkers on Forbes' brain food and in 60 days they develop forebuds, from fast growing cerebrum. There is danger that some may become veritable high-brows.

The pigs upon which it "takes" show intelligence. They cease wallowing and gambol like lambs. A 250-pounder doing a gambol would bring tears to the eyes of the Sphinx.

By preparing the food scientifically and by close observation and post-mortems, Dr. Forbes determines just what benefit has been derived by his

charges. It is said with all evidence of verity that under the new order, even the crumbt become refined, while in one pen the pigs showed a tendency to become musicians, regulating their squeals to the chromatic scale.

They feed the pigs other things than brain food. One mixture produces muscle and the pig Sandow is on exhibition, while another develops an unusual amount of bone.

It all depends upon the mineral mixed with a ration of pearl hominy, wheat gluten and blood albumen. The stuff resembles a coarse predigested breakfast.

It's sort for the pigs. They live in portable bungalows in which they retire at night in one corner of the farm and awaken next morning in another. When the wind blows the bungalows are yanked to the protected side of the big barns.

It's hard to say what the experimenters would do in case a monsoon strikes the place. Monsoons you know, travel in circles.

When he concludes his experiments, Dr. Forbes is going to tell the farmers how to get results. When he is through lecturing every farmer can raise a bunch of brainy pigs for a circus, or big-boned pigs, or just every day hefty ones, with brain power added.

Dr. Forbes' theory is that a pig fed upon a certain food will show the same effect in the person eating the meat. For instance, feed a pig bone-making food and the individual who eats the pork will benefit in the same manner, in lesser degree.

"What's good for pigs is good for man," is the Forbes theory, in a few words.

WILBUR WRIGHT
SHIVERS FAST
FLIGHT RECORDS

In Air Nearly An Hour at
Speed of Over 42 Miles;
Takes Flying Class Out for
Practice.

(By Associated Press Licensed Wire.)

COLLEGE PARK, Md., Oct. 9.—With practically a dead calm settled over College Park, Wilbur Wright today broke the world's record for speed in an aeroplane over 500 metres course, including a turn beyond the course, his time being 58.2-5 seconds or 20 seconds less than that made by De Lagrange over a similar course in France.

Mr. Wright attained a speed of 42.5 miles an hour for the distance. As Wright left the starting point, Lieut. Lahm took the time. Wright made the 500 metres in the direction of Washington with a slight wind to his back in 24.1-5 seconds. He returned over the course in 24.3-4 seconds.

Wilbur Wright and his army of aeronautical pupils, taking advantage of the splendid flying weather this morning started out with the government aeroplane at the special aviation field here and made numerous short flights on one occasion acquiring a speed of forty-seven miles an hour over a measured course.

At 9 o'clock the first flight was made when the aviator encircled the large field for a period of six minutes. The machine worked smoothly and the short flight was entirely satisfactory. A few minutes after the machine was brought to the ground the aviator attempted to make a start and get the aeroplane up in the air without the use of weights and starting to west mounds. However, the machine failed in failure and the flyer was taken back to the monorail where another start was made. In this flight the machine was maneuvered through a series of circles and remained in the air three minutes.

MORAL EDUCATION

One of the most interesting addresses at the Fourth District convention of the W. C. T. U. which was held in this city this week was one on Moral Education which was read by Mrs. E. T. Read of Three Rivers. In some papers was as follows:

"That a man be honest, be just, be true, be pure, requires that he be more than a man groping in his own strength after these perfections; means that he be consecrated to the method of Christ and that he live the life that is hid with Christ."

"This education into high ideals is pre-eminently the work of the mother. Faith and love are twin sisters in the little hearts. Mother is the pattern as well as the instructor in the home. Youth must first want to be good. One of the simplest ways to teach the children to want to be good, even with the very young is to reward their little efforts in some way that means most to them. The child must be first led to see that every strong useful man must first be master of himself. Quarrelling in the home is the cause of lasting unhappiness and mothers should give study and time to correcting it, for one unwholesome spirit will spoil many other spirits. Purity of thought and action is shown by purity of speech, a very important lesson in moral education. Omit from your language anything that good English condemns. Teach your children their speech is an advertisement of what is within. Coarse impure language means unclean thoughts, careless manner and lack of decent pride. Following these teachings, it is easy to convince them that impure habits, lewd companions, smoking and drinking are enemies they must meet and conquer."

"Moral education consists not in 'Thou shalt not' nor in 'Don'ts' but in showing the clean, true and good things bring a harvest of joy and peace and that the way of the transgressor is hard and the wages of sin is death."

That was the beginning. After much persuasion the boy was induced to join the citizens family, and soon accustomed himself to the changed surroundings. His manner became more genteel. His opinion began to fall away, his whole being was undergoing a transformation. Then he developed a talent for drawing. His protector noted the ability with which the younger executed drawings, encouraged him in the work, and he is now an art student, with prospects to become noted. Claim Between \$10,000 and 20,000 as Profits in Connection With Naval Training Station Contract.

The Quinn Construction company of this city is defendant in a suit brought against it by James B. Clow & Son of Chicago for the collection of several thousand dollars alleged to be owing as the estimated profits for plumbing supplies alleged to have been contracted for but never ordered delivered. The case is on trial in the United States district court in Grand Rapids.

Attorneys John W. Adams and Frank S. Weston are representing the Quinn company. The Quinns submitted a bid for the plumbing and heating installation for the new government naval training station near Chicago, being awarded the contract before submitting its bid, it is claimed, by the defendants to the suit, conditional orders were given to the Clows and to the L. Mott Iron Works Co. of New York for the material to be used in the contract, it being specified, it is alleged, that the supplies were to be inspected and accepted by the government inspectors before a binding order for the material was placed. The Mott material was accepted by the inspectors without submitting the Clow goods to an examination. The Clows now demand payment to the amount of the estimated profits of the material which they believe they were to have furnished.

The Clows are demanding \$10,000 and \$20,000. The trial has already occupied two days of this week before the court and was adjourned Friday afternoon until Monday, when it will again be resumed.

SURVEYING SQUAD AT WORK.

The surveying squad, at work on the main line of the proposed Grand Trunk railroad, which is to enter Kalamazoo from the east, is at present about twelve miles east of the city, and working away from the city. It is expected that this work will be finished within two weeks.

SENTENCE ON
PATTERSONS

Two Get Time in Detroit House of Correction, While Third Is Sent to County Jail.

Clyde Patterson, ninety days in the Detroit house of correction.
Joseph Patterson, sixty days in the Detroit house of correction, a fine of \$10 and costs taxed at \$40; in default thereof a further confinement of 25 days or until such fine and costs are paid.

Ed Patterson, thirty days in jail, a fine of \$5 with \$30 costs, and thirty days more if payment is not forthcoming.

The above were the sentences meted out by Judge Knappen this morning in the circuit court, when the three men came before him to receive their punishment on their pleas of guilty of assault and battery against the officers who arrested them after the affray at Galesburg on the night of June 7.

The Pattersons, with William Herb- ert, were charged with resisting the officers, but by agreement between the attorneys the men were allowed to plead guilty to assault and battery.

In sentencing Clyde Patterson, the court said: "Since your incarceration I understand that you claim to have been converted. I sincerely hope that is true. But it has been brought to my attention that since your conviction you have sent word to several witnesses in Galesburg that you would 'get even' with them."

"No, your honor; that's not so," interrupted Patterson. "Whoever says that tells a falsehood."

"Well, it was reported to me only this morning," continued the judge. "In your case, taking into consideration that you deliberately went to Galesburg, as I understand, to 'clean up on the town,' I will sentence you ninety days in the Detroit reformatory."

Patterson's expression was anything but pleasing after he heard his sentence.

The next to receive his punishment was Joseph (Dode) Patterson, who is alleged to be the ringleader of the bunch which created the Galesburg riot. Standing before the judge, Patterson handed him several letters, with the evident purpose of securing leniency. "Expend letters," read aloud, being recommendations from Patterson's former employers as to his efficiency as a workman.

Without commenting on the elder Patterson's pleas, or the fact that the judge himself, when prosecuting attorney of Kalamazoo county had convicted him of an offense, the court passed sentence.

In the case of Ed Patterson, the court stated that he was inclined to show some leniency, which was displayed in the jail sentence given.

CRANE NOT AFRAID OF
OFFICIAL REPRIMAND

Declares His Utterances Were With Sanction of President.

[By Associated Press. Licensed Wire.] CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 9.—The Tribune today prints an interview with Chas. R. Crane, the minister to China which reads in part:

"Charles R. Crane, now on his way from San Francisco to Washington, in response to a sudden recall on the eve of his departure for the Orient, has little fear of a reprimand at the hands of the state department."

Replying to published reports that his recall was for the purpose of reprimanding him for a too favorable attitude of the diplomat relations between his country and China, Mr. Crane let it be known that what he has said on several occasions since his appointment was with the sanction and approval of President Taft. He is of the opinion that the order for his state department, which arrested his departure, has nothing to do with speeches which have been suggested as causes of official displeasure.

STERNFIELD'S SAFE
RIFLED, \$150 GONE

Proprietor of Store Cannot Tell How It Happened.

A safe, belonging to Mr. Sternfield, a north Burdick street merchant, was rifled Friday afternoon of \$150 in bank notes, in broad daylight. The theft was not discovered until evening, when the affair was reported to police headquarters.

There appears to be a slump in theories attempting to account for the missing of the money. The facts seem to be that Sternfield went to the safe to make change for a customer before luncheon. The next time he went to the safe was in the evening when he found the money and his bank book gone. The other contents of the safe were intact.

Sternfield admitted that the safe had been left unlocked, and seemed to think that two prospective customers had entered together and that one went through the strong box while the other engaged the attention of the clerk.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—The balmy weather of the last two weeks has caused the strawberry plants in northern New Jersey to bear fruit for the second time this year. All of the strawberry farms are producing, and the berries have reached the market in such quantities that they are selling at ten cents a quart.

The thief was recently arrested in Battle Creek on another charge and is now doing time in the Calhoun county jail at Marshall.

RABBI THINKS
LABORER WORTHY
OF HIS HIRE

In First of Five Sermons on "The Church Today," Mr. Thurman Advocates Larger Salaries for Ministers.

Declaring that the church of today should be a sponsor for such Sabbath recreation as is necessary for the moral and physical welfare of a certain class of men, and that ministers should receive a larger salary to enable them to live the social lives necessary to their success, Rabbi Samuel Thurman delivered the first of a series of five addresses on "The Church Today," Friday evening at the Jewish tabernacle. The theme for the address was "Pure Religion."

In the opening of his address he outlined the course of the series.

In part Rabbi Thurman said: "In any examination of the church today we are brought face to face with the compelling fact that it has its struggle. In speaking of the church I refer to the Occidental church. It does not present the same aspect as the Oriental church. The religious man of the Orient puts religion first and then life. There is something in the Oriental religion that might approach the category of pure religion, pure in the absolute sense of the term. There is no such thing as pure religion in the church today. Just as life has in it the admixture of death so the church today has about it the clinging appendages that are really not religious. Religion must be vested in terms that the community can understand. Thus we have learned that the Sabbath was made for man and that the church must guide man in the use of the Sabbath. If then that is the only day on which man can have the recreation that is necessary for his moral and physical welfare the church must stand sponsor for that recreation. In short the church today is coming to understand slowly in some quarters but surely everywhere that it is the keeper of the morality of its members and that the morality of its members today is not a religious but a social morality."

"Our ministers need higher salaries, for they must have more social lives, and social lives whose characters are determined by success. No man can be merchant or minister can carry much weight nowadays, unless he is a success from a money standpoint."

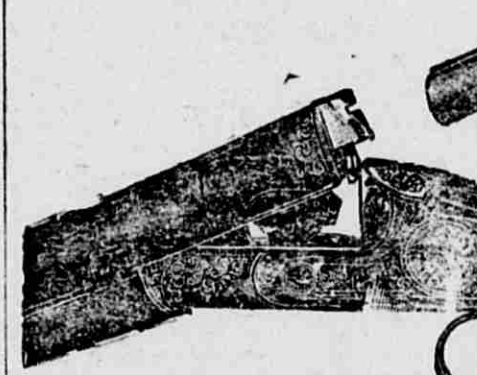

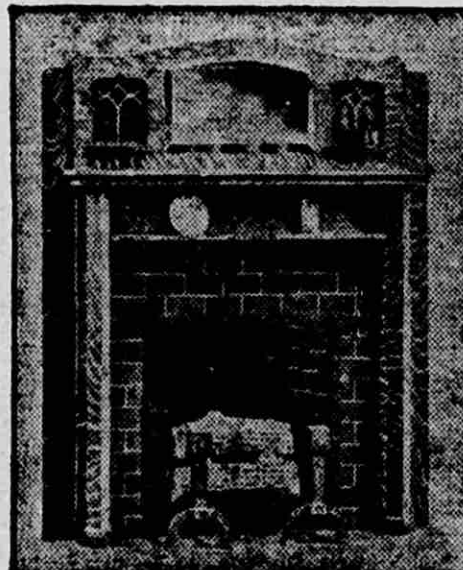

NEW FEATURES STIR UP COUNTRY SCHOOLS
